Guildry Bursaries "Life Changing"

For over thirty years, the University of Dundee's Access Summer School has offered a pathway for thousands of talented students whose background or circumstance might otherwise obstruct their route to a university education.

The programme offers an alternative way of qualifying for entry to university and prepares aspiring students for study. The free, five-week programme offers both an online and an on-campus programme that provides students with the tools and support they need to reach their full academic potential, opening doors to a future full of exciting possibilities. Since 2020, 73% of Access Summer School students have gone on to study

at the University of
Dundee. The same
percentage (73%) of
students come from
areas in Q1 or Q2 on the
Scottish Index of Multiple
Deprivation, which are
the most deprived areas
in Scotland.

proud to support two students who successfully graduated from the Access Summer School with annual bursaries of £3000 throughout their degree programmes. The first, Mia Williams graduated with a 2(i) honours degree in Psychology in June 2024. Mia said:

"The highlight for me has really been gaining the

scholarship from the Guildry Incorporation of Dundee. I would like to say thank you so much for being so supportive and helpful throughout my studies. I am eternally grateful for all they have done for me."

The second, Charlie O'Neill started her studies in September 2022, but suffered unforeseen and unforeseeable severe domestic problems which prevented her completing her second year successfully. The Guidry is continuing to support her endeavours to the completion of her course.

We hope that all members of the Guildry feel the sense of satisfaction that comes from the knowledge that we have changed someone's life for the better and for good.

The Dundee Primary Schools Enterprise Project needs you!

Now in its 16th year, the Dundee Primary Schools Enterprise Project has been one of the most successful initiatives undertaken by the Dundee Guildry. It dynamically blends the immense business experience and business talents of Guildry members with the development needs of young pupils at P6/7 level in primary schools. Pupils at this age are highly receptive and very keen to

learn about the world of work.



With modest capital provided by the Guildry (£150 this year), each class conceives, develops and delivers a business initiative,

guided by Guildry mentors, donating any proceeds to a charity of their choice. The aim is to give the children the chance to develop a wide range of skills such as negotiation; judgement and decision making; creative arts and marketing skills; people management and, above all, team working.

Applications are currently rolling in from many schools and we need a minimum of at least 12 + Guildry mentors who will adopt a class and coach them through the various stages of work between end February to end April. Fear not, if you have not done this before, as you will be given a briefing by an experienced mentor and the programme can fit around your availability.

Experienced mentor, Bill Barr, comments "It is a win-win experience. The benefits are enormous to both teachers and their pupils who always engage enthusiastically and with unbelievable energy as they see their project through from beginning to end. As a mentor, it is really rewarding and tremendous fun to see both teachers and staff develop as they take on board your recommendations, where required. You can definitely count me in again this year. I would not miss it for the world."

26th October 1199 - Dundee's Game of Thrones

The Victorian antiquary A.C. Lamb, in his *Dundee* of 1895, first clocked the Dundee trading grant of 1199 in the parchment rolls in the PRO in London, then had the roll sketched and translated. Dennis F. Collins, former Clerk and later Archivist to the Guildry, then highlighted its octocentenary in 1999.

John, by the Grace of God, King, Know ye that we have given and concede and by this our present Charter have confirmed to the Burgesses of Earl David, brother of the King of Scotland, that they may be free and quit of toll and of all other dues which pertain to us throughout all our lands except the City of London...

The original would only have been about 7"x 3"; parchment was valuable and not to be wasted. Our original in the Dundee burgh kist probably got hammered by *Malleus Scotorum* a century later.

King John, known for his later Magna Carta of 1215, had been crowned King of England in May 1199 after his brother Richard *Coeur de Lion*, having survived tussles with Saladin in the Middle East, was felled by a crossbow sniper while besieging a castle in Limousin, Central France. Four months later, in his fortress at Roche Andeley in Normandy, surrounded by top ranking French and English clergy and nobility, John is handing over a major trading grant to David Earl of Huntingdon, brother of King William the Lion of Scotland, known to Scots by his Gaelic nickname *Garbh*, ('The Rough').

What is going on here? All three, as *Poileas Alba* would say, "had previous history". There was a serious rebellion in 1173/4 against King Henry II of England by three of his sons, his wife Eleanor of Aquitaine, and their rebel supporters, including *Garbh* and brother David. In return *Garbh* would in theory have Northumberland, but in July 1174 he was captured at Alnwick, taken in chains to Newcastle, then to Falaise in Normandy via Northampton and Caen. John, then eight years old, would have chatted amiably to *Garbh* in Norman French, still the language of court today for confirmation of Acts of Parliament with *Le Roy le veult* ("The King wishes it").

Henry then sent an army to occupy Scotland. As ransom and to regain his kingdom, *Garbh* had to acknowledge Henry as his feudal superior and agree to pay for the cost of the English army's occupation at a cost of 40,000 Scottish merks (£26,000 sterling). The economic worth of that sum today would a minimum of eight figures, and it would have bankrupted Scotland for decades. *Garbh* and Henry negotiated peace on 8th December 1174 at

Valogne in Normandy, the Treaty of Falaise was signed and *Garbh* was then allowed to return to Scotland. On 10th August 1175 he swore fealty to Henry II at York Castle.

The Treaty of Falaise remained in force for the next fifteen years until Cœur de Lion,

needing money to take part

in the Third Crusade, agreed to terminate it in return for 10,000 silver Scots merks (£6,500 sterling), on 5th December 1189. In 1200, *Garbh* would pay homage for Northumbria, (not for Scotland), to John, apparently to save face.

So. What's going on in this Game of Thrones? Was the charter of 1199 considered an outstanding settlement under the Treaty of Falaise? Or was this an encouragement to *Garbh* to bend the knee the next year? Or was John watching his back and was the charter of 1199 a carrot to two brothers who had tried to ambush his father twenty-five years before? That, dear reader, is for you to decide!
